### **Lord Teverson, MEUC President**

An economist by training, is a member of the House of Lords where he leads on energy and climate change issues. He was a Member of the European Parliament for Cornwall and West Plymouth between 1994 and 1999, becoming one of the first Liberal Democrats to be elected. Before entering the European Parliament, Robin spent 16 years in the freight industry.

### **Daniel Kenyon, Environmental Co-ordinator, Wallwork Heat Treatment**

Daniel was born and raised in Greater Manchester around foundries and industry. Interested in science he began work experience at the age of 18 at Wallwork Heat Treatment Ltd who are long time members of the MEUC. He continued to work in the laboratory whilst studying away at Leicester University and received a Bachelors Degree in Chemistry. Returning to Wallwork full time after University, Daniel moved from the Laboratory to join the Quality and Environmental teams. From his experience in Environmental management, Daniel took on the role of energy purchasing for the Wallwork group and has been in the energy industry for 6 years now as an end user with a significant energy consumption and portfolio.



### **Jonathan Brearley, Chief Executive, Ofgem**

Jonathan Brearley became Ofgem's Chief Executive Officer on 3 February 2020. This follows his previous appointment as our Executive Director for Systems and Networks in April 2018.

He has wide-ranging energy sector experience, having led Electricity Market Reform as the Director for Energy Markets and Networks at DECC. Prior to this, he was Director of the Office of Climate Change, a cross-government strategy unit focussed on climate change and energy issues, where he led the development of the Climate Change Act. Earlier in his career, Jonathan was a senior adviser in the Prime Minister's Strategy Unit.

He holds a Bachelor's degree in Mathematics and Physics from Glasgow University and a Master's degree in Economics from the University of Cambridge.
